WALKERBURN AND DISTRICT COMMUNITY COUNCIL

DRAFT Minutes of the Meeting Held on 19th February 2025

Present: Mr Kerr (Chairman), Ms Daykin, Ms Sedgwick, Mrs Thornton, Mr Waller, Mr Wilcox, Mrs Purves (Secretary), Cllr Douglas, Cllr Tatler.

Apologies: Cllr Pirone, Mrs Horsburgh, Mr Leslie, Ms Jones and Mr Wilcox.

Notices: None (The secretary asked Councillors if something was amiss in SBC Roads since there had been an

unusual dearth of roads notices but, apparently, they have also been aware of a fall-off in notices.)

Police Business: The Police Report for January had been circulated. Everyone agreed that there was a need for more active deterrence of speeding motorists and Cllr Tatler agreed to keep up pressure.

January Minutes: Ms Daykin proposed approval of the January minutes, seconded by Ms Sedgwick. The Minutes were passed.

Matters Arising:

- a. Item 7d. 50 mph Trial. Cllr Douglas reported no further action, but the matter had been raised with the Scrutiny Committee, and Clovenfords CC had also raised concerns.
- b. Item 9c. Potholes and Mess along Caberston Road. The situation has not changed, and little can be done to repair the road until the major SPEN works on the A72 are finished. SBC Roads have promised road repairs/drainage repairs early in 2026 and Councillors promised to keep pushing for this. All agreed that, as the weather improved, there must be more active and regular cleaning of the road. (Chairman to take this up with PMK).
- c. Item 9g. Rugby Club Rubbish etc. Much of the rubbish has been removed and more clearing is promised. However, the Chairman of the Rugby Club appeared to believe that the Club has some priority right to use the field. This has been checked thoroughly with SBC and there is no priority right for the Club. Historically, the field was part of a series of 'playing fields' which included a cricket pitch on the present field, with hockey and football fields beyond. The aim is to make the Playing Field accessible and suitable for all types of recreational use, with further development planned.

Correspondence: List circulated to members. No immediate actions required. **Planning:**

- a. General. Mr Thornton reported that FLS had applied for permission to build a logging track in Thornielee forest but there had been no objections.
- b. Wind Farms. (The secretary read Mr Wilcox's report) Mr Wilcox had organised a meeting with the Peebles CC Planning Representative and the Chairman but was unable to attend at the last minute. The secretary stood in for him and reported that it was clear that they understood WDCC concerns about Scawd Law and the Cross Border Connection. Mr Wilcox will keep them up to date. (WDCC had agreed to act as 'banker' for the Cross Border Alliance and Mr Wilcox will act as their Treasurer.)

The secretary then explained that she had taken the opportunity to discuss with the Peebles CC representatives the consultation on non-financial support for Community Councils since it had been agreed that, for Tweeddale, Peebles would take the lead with WDCC providing back-up. In summary, it was clear that Peebles CC shared our concerns about banking, IT and random SBC consultations as well as agreeing with our view that Tweeddale CCs should try to be more communally cooperative with possibly a regular 'WhatsApp' meeting for chairs/secretaries. Members agreed that the secretary should pursue this further with Peebles CC and others. (Action: Secretary)

Update on Public Consultation Event 22nd February 2025:

- a. Name of Event would be "Your Community: Your Voice"
- b. As agreed previously, this is a consultation event for WDCC so although clubs etc were welcome to put up small posters, there would only be one club stand, and this was for the Craft Club given their recent flood costs. All agreed that it made sense for the Festival and Hall to have stands since both needed more consultation with the community to help set their direction. The secretary noted that the Arts Collective also wanted to gauge opinion for future courses, and everyone agreed that they should be "squeezed in". SBC Families/Employability would also be in attendance.
- c. Ms Daykin reported that the Publicity campaign was successful to date with the Peeblesshire kindly giving free publicity under two headings and posters having been put up everywhere locally. She went on to outline the final effort to get people involved.
- d. All catering was in hand and Mr Peter White was playing a major role in helping in the kitchen, with 2 volunteers providing soup and WDCC members who could bake, baking.
- e. A contact list for clubs etc had been prepared for the day.

Afternote: A revised contact list will be published by Burning Issues.

Reports by Members:

- a. There are concerns at the growing use of electric bikes, scooters and trail bikes on the Pump Track. Further signage was discussed but the general feeling was that people who misuse the track should be reported to someone but to whom? Everyone agreed to consider whether a request for a local ordinance of some kind specifically banning powered vehicles from the pump track would help residents and the Police to control misuse. (To be discussed further)
- b. There has been another spate of incidents between pedestrians and HGV/PMK drivers on Caberston Road with abusive language being aimed at concerned pedestrians. It was agreed that the Chairman would send a formal letter of complaint to PMK.

Afternote: Letter sent and PMK have been monitoring speeds. Police have also helped by having a presence with a speed gun and FLS have warned all contractors. This has helped in the short term but has to be monitored by everyone involved.

- c. There are a number of complaints about untidy areas which could possibly be tackled by the Unpaid Work Team: WDCC will continue to try to get their help with path maintenance in particular.
- d. Thanks to the Parks Foreman for his quick response to the broken steps on the wooden walkway in Alexandra Park.
- e. The Chairman expressed appreciation to Councillors for their funding of 2-way radios for flood/resilience groups generally in Tweeddale. The Walkerburn test sets had already proved how useful these systems were in emergencies.

Reports by Councillors:

- a. Cllr Tatler reported on his recent useful meeting with Ch Insp Fletcher to discuss the problems of back road diversions when incidents closed the A72. Consideration is now being given to 'flip-up' signage on the A72 so that Police called to an incident could quickly activate a one-way west to east system on the back road as one part of a diversion with the other east to west diversion being routed to the A7. More to follow but members were supportive. Cllr Tatler went on to report good progress in the Chambers Institute re-design and to explain the work being carried out on future funding and organisation of Live Borders. In answer to a question, he explained that the Eastgate funding had been separate from Live Borders funding and that nothing had yet been decided about this, but he asked everyone to keep in mind the very tight financial constraints and the need to provide for Arts funding throughout the Borders.
- b. Cllr Douglas noted that the next Area Partnership meeting was scheduled for 25th March in the Burgh Hall, Peebles. He explained that the system of Area Partnerships was under review and echoed Cllr Tatler's remarks about funding constraints. He reported that Peebles High School's new buildings should be ready for opening in September with the old school being scheduled for demolition by the end of 2026. The Chairman asked if it would be possible for Community Councillors to attend one of the group 'tours' of the new school and Cllr Douglas promised to suggest this. Finally, Cllr Douglas reminded everyone that the SBC cross-party budget for the next year was very tight and everyone should expect to see less availability of funds for good causes.

MARCH WILDSIDE

I know that it is, scientifically speaking, Spring and there are lots of snowdrops etc in flower just now, but it still feels like winter with some very cold winds!

Nevertheless, I have primroses just showing colour in their flower buds and the birds are starting to pair up, ready for their breeding season. There are a pair of Little Egrets working the ditch on the south side of the bridge and, of course, the oystercatchers are very vocal. I take it the egrets will be looking for frogs in the mud as well as any other tasty muddy morsels. It would be great if they were a pair and managed to raise a family here.

The woodland birds we see in the trees locally or that visit our gardens will soon be paired up and raising a family. We have a pair of nuthatches that visit our feeders regularly so I'm hopeful they'll bring baby nuthatches here later in Spring. Nesting usually starts in late April and they raise two broods a year. Nuthatches tend to occupy a hole in a tree particularly old woodpecker holes but 'mud' up the hole to make the opening smaller. Typically, six to eight eggs are laid, with the chicks hatching after around two weeks. Fledging normally occurs after around three to four weeks. So, I've plenty of time yet. By then, I should have my summer bedding!

If all the birds that visit the garden, raise young and bring them here, we'll have a great selection of small birds. I like seeing the parents "training" the young to use the feeders. It doesn't usually take them long to learn, but it's so much easier to keep pestering mum and dad. Familiar to all parents!

Anyone who reads this column regularly will know I feed the birds all year round to some degree, and I take great pleasure in seeing them close up in our garden. Many people put food out for birds, but fewer provide a regular supply of clean water. Birds need water for drinking and bathing. Birds get the liquid they need from their food, and by drinking. Many insectivorous birds get most of their water from food, while seed-eating birds have a dry diet and they need to drink more.

The simplest way to provide water is a bird bath, essentially a dish of water. Dirty bird baths can be at least as serious sources of disease as dirty bird tables. Allowing pathogens to accumulate in the water will risk the birds' health, and some can be transmitted to any pets and other wildlife that drink from the bird bath. Give the bath a thorough clean every week or so as you clean your bird feeders and tables. Scrub it well to remove algae and other dirt. You can use diluted household disinfectants, white vinegar or cleaners specifically formulated for bird baths, but make sure that you rinse the bath out thoroughly to remove any traces of chemicals. Since there is a small but real risk of infections like salmonella being transmitted to people, always exercise good hygiene when cleaning bird baths, just as you would do with feeders. Always clean the bird bath outdoors using separate brushes/cloths, wear gloves and wash your hands when finished. Remember then to refresh water daily. Bird baths are particularly important during the winter, when natural supplies may be frozen, and in dry conditions that occur mainly during summer. In freezing conditions, birds will become more dependent on water provided in gardens, since many natural sources of water are frozen over. It can be difficult to stop a bird bath from freezing in winter, but the following ideas may help. A light ball, placed in the water, will be moved by even a gentle breeze and will keep just a small amount of water ice free. I use plastic ducks but family dogs like to steal them just as much as they love balls! You could line the bath with polythene so you can just lift out the ice easily and put fresh water in. Alternatively, as a last resort, use hot water to melt the ice but never use additives such as antifreeze or glycerine as this can destroy the waterproofing and insulating properties of feathers, or may even be toxic.

Hopefully we won't have to worry too much about frosts for that much longer although my husband remembers frost in June so I won't be out with my summer bedding just yet.
